# 2015 TRAFFIC STATEMENT ST. MARYS FALLS CANAL, SAULT STE. MARIE, MICHIGAN U.S. ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS, DETROIT DISTRICT

The 2015 commercial navigation season through the United States locks began on March 25, 2015, and ended 297 days later on January 15, 2016. On March 23, 2015, the U.S. Coast Guard cutter MACKINAW passed through the Poe Lock for icebreaking operations.

The first commercial vessel for the season was the M/V EDWIN H. GOTT (U.S.-flag) on March 25 upbound for Two Harbors, Minnesota. The last commercial vessel was the tug ANGLIAN LADY pushing the barge PML IRON MASTER, which locked down through the Poe Lock on January 15, 2016, bound for Burns Harbor. Indiana.

Delays are defined as the elapsed time a vessel spends waiting to proceed with a lockage. Thirty-nine vessels were delayed by ice for a total of 30 hours 19 minutes. Lock and hardware malfunctions accounted for 32 vessels being delayed a total of 9 hours 48 minutes. Repairing lock or lock equipment accounted for 2 vessels being delayed a total of 24 minutes. Sixteen vessels were delayed by interference by other vessels for 7 hours 7 minutes. One vessel was delayed by lightning near the lock totaling 1 hour 12 minutes. Two vessels were delayed by ice on lock or lock equipment for 1 hour 12 minutes. Three vessels were delayed 1 hour 19 minutes by tow staff occupied with other duties. Other delays affected one vessel and accounted for 43 minutes.

The MacArthur Lock was down due to repairing lock or lock hardware for 18 days 22 hours between July 29 and August 17. During that time 136 vessels were delayed a total of 262 hours when all factors were incorporated into the delay time.

The largest cargo recorded for a single passage in the 2015 season was 71,537 tons of iron ore carried by the M/V EDWIN H. GOTT on August 4. The greatest seasonal cargo total transported by a single vessel was 3,034,799 tons of iron ore, again carried by the GOTT.

The smallest cargo for a single passage was 24 tons of iron ore carried by M/V BAIE COMEAU on November 16.

Cargo flow was greatest during the month of May with 9,164,312 tons passing through the locks. A total of 3,523 cargo carriers passed through the locks during the 2015 season, a decrease of 462 from the 2014 season. An annual total of 68,740,609 tons of freight was recorded. This was 8,811,677 tons below the 2014 total. Total vessel passages decreased from 7,284 in 2014 to 6,448 in 2015. Freight decreased by 11.36 percent and total passages decreased by 11.48 percent.

Comparing the movement of cargo in and out of Lake Superior, 20 commodities experienced decreases from 2014 with iron ore seeing the biggest: 6,840,959 tons. Eleven commodities experienced increases in volume from 2014 with slag seeing the biggest (269,750 tons), followed by wheat (220,620 tons). Several other cargos experienced increases or decreases of 100 percent; this was attributed to no cargo movement during the previous year or present year.
