## 2002 TRAFFIC STATEMENT: ST. MARYS FALLS CANAL, MICHIGAN U.S. ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS, DETROIT DISTRICT

The 2002 commercial navigation season through the United States locks began on March 25, 2002, and ended 297 days later on January 15, 2003. On March 19, 2002, the U.S. Coast Guard icebreaker MACKINAW passed upbound through the Poe Lock. The first commercial vessel for the season was the M/V INDIANA HARBOR on March 25, downbound with western coal for Muskegon, Michigan. The Poe Lock remained in service until 12:00 p.m. on January 15, 2003. The last commercial vessel, the tug RELIANCE and barge PML 9000, passed through the Poe Lock that day, downbound for Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario.

Delays are defined as the elapsed time a vessel spends waiting to proceed with a lockage. Twelve vessels reported being delayed by ice for a total of 9 hours 49 minutes. Tow malfunctions/breakdowns contributed 49 minutes and lock hardware malfunctions accounted for 2 hours 44 minutes. Lock maintenance and testing totaled 20 hours 32 minutes. All other delays amounted to 24 hours 46 minutes. The St. Marys River was reported as being closed by the U.S. Coast Guard for visibility and other reasons for a total of 4 days 3 hours 29 minutes.

The largest cargo reported for a single passage in the 2002 season was 67,847 net tons of iron ore, carried by the M/V OBLEBAY NORTON (Oglebay Norton Marine Services Company) on August 13. The greatest total seasonal cargo transported by an individual vessel was 2,876,399 net tons of iron ore carried by the M/V GEORGE A. STINSON (Stinson, Inc., operated by American Steamship Company).

Cargo flow was greatest during the month of August, with 9,996,958 net tons passing through the locks. A total of 4,543 cargo carriers passed through the locks during the 2002 season, an increase of 234 from 2001. An annual total of 82,044,087 net tons of freight were recorded. This was 5,656,926 net tons above the 2001 total. Total vessel passages decreased from 8,731 in 2001 to 8,680 in 2002. Freight increased by 7.41 percent and total passages decreased by 0.58 percent.

Comparing the movement of cargo in and out of Lake Superior, 11 commodities experienced decreases from 2001 volumes ranging from 5.04 percent (wheat) to 100 percent (sunflower seeds). Eight commodities increased in volume ranging from 4.07 percent (coal) to 487.94 percent (scrap iron). The greatest single gain in cargo tonnage was 6,466,376 net tons of iron ore, while the most significant decrease was 458,417 net tons of stone.
